




North Gem Wrestling

North Gem Boys Basketball January Report

The North Gem boys basketball team put together a successful month of January. At the time of this writing, the boys had won 6 and lost 3 during the first month of 2024.

The boys kicked off the new year with a big home win against Sho-Ban 63 - 33. Ryver Hayden led the way with 19 points and a career high 16 rebounds. The Cowboys followed this home win with a tightly contested win in Pocatello against Grace Lutheran. The game was much closer than the final score indicated as the boys battled for the entire game and eventually ended up winning 57 - 44. Evan O'Brien paced the Cowboys with a strong 26 points and 19 rebounds.

The following week saw the schedule get wrecked by the weather with a couple of games getting cancelled. The North Gem teams managed to squeeze in a conference game at Watersprings early in the week however. Despite a valiant effort in which the boys had whittled a double-digit Watersprings lead to just 5 several times in the 4th quarter, the Cowboys eventually fell 57 - 43.

The Cowboys split a couple of road conference games the following week, beating Sho-Ban 48-38 and losing to Mackay 61 - 55. In the Sho-Ban game, Gage Setser stuffed the stat sheet with 8 points, 4 rebounds, 5 assists, and 2 steals while Evan O'Brien turned in his usual double double with 12 points and 13 rebounds. Against Mackay, we had four players, Ryver Hayden, Craig Yost, Gage Setser, and Evan O'Brien all score in double figures in the losing effort.

The boys bounced back from their loss at Mackay with two important conference wins at home against Leadore and Taylor's Crossing. Both games were won by at least 25 points and represented the high water mark for the Cowboys offense so far this season with 72 and 65 points scored, respectively. The boys, playing their 4th game in 7 days, took a tough loss at Malad to end the games so far in January.

The boys have really come together as a team and have set themselves up to be in a position to host a district playoff game or two in a couple of weeks.

Idaho Students Selected for United States Senate Youth Program Students Headed to Washington, D. C. and to Receive \$10,000 Scholarship

January 09, 2024, Washington, D.C. —The United States Senate Youth Program (USSYP) announces that high school students Ms. Alyson Chloe Reed and Ms. AnnMarie Juliet Wolfley will join Senator Mike Crapo and Senator James E. Risch in representing Idaho during the 62nd annual USSYP Washington Week, to be held March 2 — 9, 2024. Alyson Reed of Bancroft and AnnMarie Wolfley of Blackfoot were selected from among the state's top student leaders to be part of the 104 national student delegation. Each delegate will also receive a \$10,000 college scholarship for undergraduate study.

The USSYP was created by Senate Resolution 324 in 1962 and has been sponsored by the Senate and fully funded by The Hearst Foundations since inception. Originally proposed by Senators Kuchel, Mansfield, Dirksen and Humphrey, the Senate leadership of the day, the impetus for the program as stated in Senate testimony is "to increase young Americans' understanding of the interrelationships of the three branches of government, learn the caliber and responsibilities of federally elected and appointed officials, and emphasize the vital importance of democratic decision making not only for America but for people around the world."

Each year this extremely competitive merit-based program provides the most outstanding high school students - two from each state, the District of Columbia and the Department of Defense Education Activity - with an intensive week-long study of the federal government and the people who lead it. The overall mission of the program is to help instill within each class of USSYP student delegates more profound knowledge of the American political process and a lifelong commitment to public service. In addition to the program week, The Hearst Foundations provide each student with a \$10,000 undergraduate college scholarship with encouragement to continue coursework in government, history and public affairs. All expenses for Washington Week are also provided by The Hearst Foundations; as stipulated in Senate Resolution 324, no government funds are utilized.

Alyson Reed, a senior at North Gem High School, serves as the president of the Student Body. Hailing from the small town of Bancroft, she has faced challenges that propelled her into leadership roles. From serving as class president to leading her Young Women's group and participating in the 4-H ambassadors program, she honed her leadership skills, emphasizing effective communication and conflict resolution. Her commitment to community service shines through active participation in local blood drives, organization of service projects, and contributions to humanitarian efforts. Alyson's impact is evident in initiatives such as providing supplies for a women's shelter and participating in projects benefiting children in need in Africa. Her leadership roles and impactful community service showcase her dedication to making a positive difference. After graduation, she plans to go into radiologic sciences and become a radiology technician.

Her involvement with the Veterans Day parade has allowed her to gain insight into sacrifice and leadership. Her roles as a the Junior Class president, involvement in speech and debate, and recognition in the National Junior Honor Society highlight her collaborative, communications and character-driven qualities. Musical talents, resilience in cross country, and academic achievements reflect her dedication and mental strength. As a former Young Women's president within her church community, AnnMarie demonstrates organizational leadership and a commitment to service projects. She aims to explore the historical context of the government and hopes for firsthand exposure to the political world, aspiring to understand global conflicts and influential leaders' perspectives. She hopes to attain a bachelor's degree in English education with a minor in political science before attending law school, and would like to pursue a career as a prosecuting attorney and possibly work in the Idaho legislature.

Chosen as alternates to the 2024 program were Mr. Nicholas Mendez, a resident of Caldwell, who attends Caldwell High School and Ms. Jeni Hammon, a resident of Emmett, who attends Emmett High School.


Delegates and alternates are selected by the state departments of education nationwide and the District of Columbia and Department of Defense Education Activity, after nomination by teachers and principals. The chief state school officer for each jurisdiction confirms the final selection. This year's Idaho delegates and alternates were designated by Debbie Critchfield, Superintendent of Public Instruction.

During the program week, the student delegates will attend meetings and briefings with senators, the president, a justice of the Supreme Court, and leaders of cabinet agencies, among others.

In addition to outstanding leadership abilities and a strong commitment to volunteer work, the student delegates rank academically in the top one percent of their states among high school juniors and seniors. Now more than 6,100 strong, alumni of the program continue to excel and develop impressive qualities that are often directed toward public service. Among the many distinguished alumni are: Senator Susan Collins, the first alumnus to be elected U.S. senator; Secretary of Transportation and former Mayor of South Bend Indiana, Pete Buttigieg, the first alumnus to be appointed as a cabinet secretary; former Senator Cory Gardner, the second alumnus to be elected U.S. senator and the first to be elected to the U.S. House of Representatives; former New Jersey Governor Chris Christie, the first alumnus to be elected governor; former Chief Judge Robert Henry, U.S. Court of Appeals for the Tenth Circuit; former Ambassador to West Germany Richard Burt and former presidential advisors Thomas "Mack" McLarty and Karl Rove. Additional notables include former Lt. Governor of Idaho David Leroy, former Provost of Wake Forest University Rogan Kersh, military officers, members of state legislatures, Foreign Service officers, top congressional staff, healthcare providers and other university educators.

Members of the U. S. Senate Youth Program 2024 annual Senate Advisory Committee are: Senator Catherine Cortez Masto of Nevada, the 2024 USSYP Democratic Co-Chair and Senator John Barrasso, M.D. of Wyoming, the 2024 USSYP Republican Co-Chair. The full USSYP Senate Advisory Committee consists of the vice president of the United States and the Senate majority and minority leaders who annually serve as the program's Honorary Co-Chairs; two senators, one from each party, serving as acting Co-Chairs who each have keynote speaking roles, and an eight-member bipartisan Senate panel, four senators from each party, who lend their names in support. Serving on the Advisory Committee for the upcoming program are: Senator John Fetterman of Pennsylvania, Senator Maggie Hassan of New Hampshire, Senator Edward J. Markey of Massachusetts, Senator Alex Padilla of California, Senator John Boozman of Arkansas, Senator Katie Britt of Alabama, Senator John Hoeven of North Dakota and Senator Thom Tillis of North Carolina.

CHESTERFIELD HISTORICAL STORY



CHESTER CALL FILE, DUP HISTORY COLLECTION

Being a bishop and a polygamist, Chester Call was a prominent figure pursued by federal agents and U.S. marshals. For about ten years, from 1882 until 1893, Chester spent considerable time avoiding arrest. On one occasion while he was attending a church service, marshals stationed themselves at the doors to arrest polygamists when the meeting ended.

Chester was informed that the agents were waiting to capture him. As soon as the meeting was over, he changed clothing while another man by the name of Mabey, who was dressed like Chester and about the same size and age, left the church looking as suspicious as possible. As soon as he caught the eyes of the agents, he ran down the street.

As hoped, the agents chased him. When they finally caught him, they demanded to know his name. "Are you Chester Call?" "Mabey," he answered. "Maybe it is and maybe it ain't, but you're under arrest," charged the marshals. Meanwhile, Chester had slipped out unnoticed, jumped onto his buckboard, and escaped undetected."

Bancroft's First School

Bancroft's First School Marker

Inscription: One block west from this site, in 1894, the pioneers of this area erected a school house built of red brick made and kilned by them. It was one room, twenty-five by forty feet. Cuss Erickson laid the brick, first teachers were Edith Townsend and Nathan Barlow. In 1907 the school was sold to the L.D.S. Church and additional rooms built. It was used as a place of worship until 1930. The bell hung in a tower of the school house and called the people to school, church, and other assemblies. When the building was razed in 1945 the bell was given to the Daughters of Utah Pioneers.

Location. 42° 43.174' N, 111° 53.121' W. Marker is in Bancroft, Idaho, in Caribou County. Marker is at the intersection of Main Street and 1st Street South, on the right when traveling north on Main Street. Marker is at or near this postal address: 95 Main Street, Bancroft ID 83217

Other nearby historical markers. At least 8 other markers are within 10 miles of this marker, measured as the crow flies. <u>Chesterfield</u> (approx. 4.8 miles away); <u>Ivins Pioneer</u> <u>Cemetery</u> (approx. 5.4 miles away); <u>Hudspeth's Cutoff</u> (approx. 6.4 miles away); <u>Lava Hot</u> <u>Springs' healing waters</u> (approx. 9.2 miles away)

According to Idaho's IRI scores, almost half of Idaho's children enter kindergarten below grade level and nearly a third of them are still not performing at grade level at the end of the school year.
