Dear North Gem Community,



Idaho Reading Indicator (IRI)

The Idaho Reading Indicator (IRI) assessment measures literacy proficiency and is conducted in the fall and spring semesters of each school year. According to Idaho's IRI scores, almost half of Idaho's children enter kindergarten below grade level and nearly a third of them are still not performing at grade level at the end of the school year.
